Block of the Month

Block of the Month 2024: Block #5

Hello all. The May block is called Mosaic #10. This is our first of four blocks made entirely from half square triangles (HSTs). For this block, we need the focus fabric, a white fabric, a light, and a dark coordinating fabric. Remember, all our blocks end up 12.5" X 12.5" (a 12" finished block.) This block is due at the June meeting.

Cut list -- For one block Focus Fabric: One 4" square White: Six 4" squares Light Coord. Fabric: Eight 4" squares Dark Coord. Fabric: One 4" square Assembling the block: Use a guarter inch seam.

Make half square triangles (HSTs):

- Pair up a light coordinating square with each of the other squares. Draw a line on one diagonal with a pencil or other fabric marking tool, on the lighter colored fabric of each pair. Pin or clip in two places to hold together. (Photo 2) Sew a seam $\frac{1}{4}$ " from either side of this line. Cut apart on the diagonal line. (Photo 3) Press the seams open. (Photo 4) Trim each new square to 3.5". To do this, use a ruler with a 45° line. Place the 45° line on the center seam and trim off flags and extra fabric. (Photo 5 -ignore the size of this block - it's just an example.)
- Arrange HSTs as shown in final block. I like to start with the middle. Arrange the four pieces with dark coordinating fabric and focus fabric. Place the light coordinating triangles so they point together in the middle. Have the matching focus and dark coordinating triangles on opposite corners. Next, four white and light coordinating are put in the outer corners with the light coordinating

Photo 5 facing out and the white facing in. The remaining white and light coordinating are placed so they make 3/4's of a square around the dark coordinating and focus fabric triangles.


- Sew the horizontal rows together. Alternate the direction you press each of the rows. These rows should be 3.5" wide and 12.5" long.
- Sew the four rows together, the seams should nest. Press.
- Finished block should be $12\frac{1}{2}$ " X $12\frac{1}{2}$ ".






2024 Challenge Quilt

You are invited to join me on an epic study of your interpretation of Stained Glass. Several of us have journeyed to foreign lands to view epic European stained glass in churches, cathedrals, and museums. I have long been fascinated with this art form, and would love to see it in fabric, of course.

First off...a few parameters:

- 1. Each member may enter one quilt in the Challenge.
- 2. The quilt must be a new project (started since September 2023.)
- 3. Whilst there is no minimum size, the maximum size is defined at 200 inches for the perimeter.
- 4. Quilts must be primarily made of fabric, with batting, backing, and some form of quilting to hold it together.
- 5. Your quilt needs a label, with name and date. (These will be covered with painters' tape for the voting.)
- 6. There will be a sign-up sheet at the meetings until and including August 2024.
- 7. The quilt should be your interpretation of stained glass. This is a very broad category; it can be modern, abstract, or traditional.
- 8. No Group Quilts.

There will be 3 judging categories:

- Originality and Creativity of Design
- Best Use of Color
- Best Workmanship

Q&A with the VOM "Sew It All"


Hello all,

We know that there are quite a few new quilters in our guild and some long-time quilters that are not up to date on all that "new fangled stuff". So, we have decided to add a column to the newsletter to help us all be more knowledgeable and maybe learn a new trick or two. To start this off, I thought I would share a little information about triangle rulers and some common quilting terms that not all quilters know.

Have you seen triangle rulers with these types of tips? If you haven't – you might want to invest in some new rulers. If you have, but don't know what they are for, here is the scoop. These tips are used to trim off the points of triangles (and some others shapes like diamonds.) If you trim the tips, the pieces will fit together like magic, no adjusting or guessing necessary.

All those little pieces you trim off and find scattered at over your sewing area all affectionately known as "dog ears".



Here are a few of those common terms:

Allover quilting: Also called edge to edge. This is when the quilting on the quilt is not specific to the blocks but is quilted in rows across the quilt.

Bias: This is the diagonal line between the lengthwise and crosswise grain of a piece of fabric. If you are working with bias edges, take care, they are very stretchy and can distort. Many times cutting directions for setting triangles are given to reduce exposure to bias edges or to get them encased by other edges as soon as possible.

BSK: Basic sewing kit (the common items needed to sew)

Chain Piecing: Sewing patchwork pieces in a continuous chain without stopping. The pieces are linked by short lengths of thread and cut apart and pressed after all are sewn.

¹/₄ inch seam: This is the seam width that quilting is based upon – assume that is what the pattern wants you to use. Getting this accurate is critical to your success.

Scant seam: One thread width less than the ¹/₄ inch seam—this is used when the designer wants to allow for the extra added when pressing a seam

WOF: Width of Fabric – used when fabric is cut selvedge to selvedge


Fat Quarter Exchange


