Block of the Month

Block of the Month 2023: Block #7

Hello – this month we are continuing our log cabin variations, and we are calling this Birds in the Cabin. The 2023 focus fabric is from Hoffman and is called Paint Impressions. In addition to the focus fabric, you will need a white fabric and two additional coordinating fabrics based on the colors in the focus fabric. Remember, all our blocks end up 12.5" X 12.5" (a 12" finished block.) We will have the focus fabric available for sale at guild meetings for \$3 per fat quarter.

Also, the Guild's website and Facebook page should have a post directing you to the YouTube instructions for this block.

Cut list -- For one block:

Focus Fabric: One 2.5" square

Coordinating fabric 1: One 2.5", one 3", & one 3.5" square (cut each on one diagonal)

Coordinating fabric 2: One 2.75" & one 3.25" square (cut each on one diagonal)

White: 1.25" wide pieces in these lengths: two 2.5", two 3.25", one each of the

following -- 4", 4.75", 5.75", 6.5", 7.75", 8.5", 10", 10.75"

1.5" wide pieces in these lengths: 4", & 5"
1.75" wide pieces in these lengths: 5.75", & 7"
2" wide pieces in these lengths: 7.75", & 9.25"
2.25" wide pieces in these lengths: 10", & 11.75"

Assembling the block: Use a quarter inch seam. Press to the newly added fabric

This block is a version of the off-center log cabin block we did last month. In this version we are adding flying geese to two corners of each round. Two adjacent sides of the block will be made with 1.25" white strips and the other two sides will have strips that gradually get wider. The coordinating fabrics are for the flying geese, alternating colors each round.

To make the piecing easier, we recommend that you arrange the pieces in the order they will be added. This means stack the $1\frac{1}{4}$ " wide pieces of white fabric from smallest to largest with largest on the bottom. Make a second stack in the same way with the other pieces of white fabric, and a third stack of the triangles of coordinating fabric. With the triangles, the colors should alternate as they get bigger.

• Round one: This is the only round that we will add pieces out of order from how you stacked them. Add 1.25" X 2.5" piece of white fabric to one side of the focus fabric square. Press. Next, add a 1.25" X 3.25" piece of white fabric to the adjacent side of the focus fabric to the left (I am giving instructions for counter-clockwise placement, if you go the other way – just do that for every piece). The piece should be the same length as the side you are adding to. Press. These two sides will be the sides that continue to have the narrow strips of white fabric added on. Keep track of the side you added to first – you will start with that side each round and always add the strips in same order. Now, turn the focus fabric piece right side up with an unsewn edge at the top and to your left. Add a 1.25" X 2.5" piece of white fabric to the top, matching the edge of the white strip to the left edge of the focus square. This piece will not extend all the way to the end; it should only be as

long at the square of focus fabric. Press. Now add 1.25" X 3.25" piece of white fabric to the last edge – this time matching the edge of the strip to the edge of the piece we just added and press.

There will be two opposite corners that don't have white fabric completely covering them. These are the corners that we will be adding the flying geese to.

• To trim these two corners, use a 45° line on your ruler and line that up with the seam line of the round just added to the block. Align the cutting edge of the ruler so ½" extends out from where the two pieces of white fabric meet in the corner (photo 2 or 5). Trim off this fabric at the corner to get a clean edge. Repeat this trimming for the

opposite corner. Remember, the corners we are trimming are the ones that don't have fabric filling out the complete corner.

- Take the two smallest triangles of coordinating and place one at each of the trimmed corners, right sides together. Center the triangles with the cut edge (**photo 3**). Sew these seams and press. Trim corners so the block is 4" square (**photo 4**.) If the corner triangle you just added doesn't completely fill out the corner, you will need to take it off and sew it back on with a smaller seam.
- Now start the second round. Find the starting edge. Repeat the instructions from above, first
- adding the two smallest 1.25" wide pieces and then the two smallest from the other stack of white strips. After you add the corners, this round should square up to $5\frac{3}{4}$ ". Keep adding rounds. Square up to $7\frac{3}{4}$ " in round three, 10" in round four, and $12\frac{1}{2}$ " in round five.

Hope you all enjoyed this block. If you are turning in blocks at the guild meeting, these are due at the September meeting.



THANKS FOR THE JAM, LADIES!!! In case anyone doesn't know, we put out a late call last month letting you know there was a shortage of jelly/jam/preserves at the US Vets pantry up at March. They typically have a good supply of peanut butter, but no jam. You responded, and we are pleased to tell you we received well over 50 jars of assorted jams, jellies, and marmalade for the vets! Way to go! Please know this is a little something you can <u>always</u> donate—an extra jar of jam on your trip to the grocery store.

We delivered 33 pet beds to Lake Elsinore Animal Friends shelter in June. Thank you, Glenda Hasseler—you made almost all of them!



We were finally able to meet for our monthly philanthropy work day this past Saturday at the Assistance League's meeting room. Due to one thing or another, including flooding renovations, poor volunteer staffing at the thrift shop, and more rigorous insurance requirements, we are at last all on the same page with AL and able to meet there. Assistance League is very happy to host us there, as we produce a whole lot of quilts, pillowcases, and Christmas stockings for a lot of foster children in the valley. The three primary places we donate goods are to foster children through our AL connection, to US Vets up at March ARB, and to Alternatives to Domestic Violence, a local women and children's shelter. There is an endless need, unfortunately, so we always appreciate whatever any of the general membership does to help. Please note, you do not have to be an "official" member of Philanthropy in order to help. ALL MEMBERS (and nonmembers!) who want to show up at one of our work days are always welcome.



We got a lot done at the June workday—we cut batts, cut and sewed backings and bindings, and made quilt tops. If YOU have unquilted quilt tops languishing in a closet at your house, tops you made for whatever reason and now don't feel like getting quilted and done, please consider giving these tops to Philanthropy. As a rule, we can and will get them finished up and donated somewhere. Our biggest obstacle to getting better production is getting the quilt tops made.

July is our Flea Market of the Mist Extravaganza, but of course we will be there to receive any of your donations. July is Undies month: Men's underwear, concentrating on sizes L, XL, XXL and anything even bigger than that if you can find them. As usual, we are happy to accept whatever you bring us.

If you can help us get some quilt tops quilted, please let us know. The bulk of our quilting falls on Maryruth Wilson and Edna Wright. We'd like to share out that load if possible.

Update on the Alternatives to Domestic Violence Shelter (Casa de Paz)

We have supported the Alternatives to Domestic Violence Shelter for over 10 years through donations of quilts and pillowcases, clothing, domestic household items, toiletries, sewing machines and fabric, children's items, food and gas cards, Christmas stockings and even furniture and appliances Last month Lynn Korito and Karen Wurfel attended a lovely 'Thank You Luncheon' for their community supporters. We were able to hear about their difficult times through the pandemic, and hear from the Board of Directors about their plans for the future.

They continue to meet the needs of hundreds of women and children each year with average stays of 3-9 months as the families receive help in all areas of housing, work and employment, access to state and federal support, therapy, rehousing and transition to independent living. They maintain a Crisis Line, Parent Education, Anger Management and Counseling Services. There have been some severe hardships and cut backs in staff through the pandemic, but their vision for the future is bright.

From Executive Director Garry Ann Brown: "Alternatives to Domestic Violence's shelter has been a vital resource for survivors in our community for the past 45 years, providing a safe and supportive space for those fleeing domestic violence and abusive situations. They house 300 plus families each year providing, shelter, food, counseling, clothing, transportation, court accompaniment, and restraining order services.

Unfortunately, the property on which our shelter is located must be purchased immediately to avoid its sale, which would put our community at risk of losing this crucial resource. In order to do so, they must raise enough funds to not only purchase the land but to pay off the mortgage on the shelter in its entirety.

To ensure that the shelter remains open and available to those who need it, the Board has set a goal of purchasing both the land and the shelter for a total of \$600,000. With your help, we can make this goal a reality and continue to secure a safe haven for survivors in our community.

Your donations which are (tax-free) will go directly toward the purchase of the land and shelter, ensuring that survivors have a safe and supportive place to turn when they need it most. Every dollar counts and no amount is too small. Please consider contributing to our campaign and sharing it with your friends and family.

Together, we can make a difference in the lives of survivors and ensure that our domestic violence shelter remains open and available for years to come. Thank you for your support."

- New pots and pans
- Small appliances: lamps, toasters, coffee pots, griddles, etc (gently used are ok if working)
- Paper goods: trash bags, toilet paper, paper towels, paper plates, napkins, plastic/paper cups and silverware
- Plates/dishes/silverware
- Kitchen items
- Towels/hand towels/washcloths
- Children's Clothes and shoes all sizes
- Women's clothes, shoes, purses (please keep in mind clean clothing in good repair or new, no vintage clothing, sturdy and appropriate to current styles – the women are in need of appropriate work/casual clothes)
- Children's books and toys (gently used no broken toys or books please)
- Furniture and Laundry/Kitchen Appliances in good working condition are also needed for residents moving out.

Friendship Braid Table Runner – Makes 2!

Pattern Designed by Donna Jordan for Jordan Fabrics Finished size 15 x 42"





Required material for 2 runners:

2 ½" strips cut WOF (also known as jelly roll strips): 12 assorted light or medium strips and 4 assorted dark strips

½ yard outer border

½ yard binding

1 ¼ yards backing

Batting or fleece -2 pieces measuring 17×45 "

Cutting Directions:

Take 1 of the light strips and sub-cut to 8@2 1/2" squares

Take 1 of the medium strips and sub-cut to 4@2 ½" squares

Take 4 dark strips and sub-cut to 2 ½" squares, for a total of 26 squares

Take the remaining light/medium strips and sub-cut to 40@10x2 ½" strips.

Borders: cut 6 (3 for each runner) strips at 2 ½" WOF. NOTE: We used 2 different border fabrics for our runners, but you can use the same material for both if you would like!

Sewing instructions for your first runner:

Take 3 dark and 4 light and 2 medium squares and stitch a nine-patch block as shown below. Steam press all seam allowances to one side.



Starting at one of the dark corners of the nine-patch, stitch one of the light/medium strips onto the right side of the nine-patch. Do not trim off the excess length. Finger-press seam allowance away from the nine-patch.



Stitch one dark accent square onto the end of a light/medium strip. Finger-press seam allowance toward the 10" strip. Stitch this onto the left side of the nine-patch unit as shown below pressing seam allowance away from the nine-patch.



Keep adding strips to the right, and strips with accent squares onto the left until you have 5 on the right and 5 on the left.



Now it is time to stitch the strips onto the other side of the nine-patch. Starting at the dark accent corner of the nine-patch, stitch on a light/medium strip onto the right side. This strip will overlap some of your previous patchwork – that is ok – just stitch along the whole side of the 10" strip then cut away the excess of the previous patchwork to leave a ¼" seam allowance.

Stitch one dark accent square onto the end of a light/medium strip. Stitch this onto the left side of the nine-patch unit. Again, this strip will overlap some of your previous patchwork - just stitch the along the whole side of the $10^{\prime\prime}$ strip and cut away the excess of the previous patchwork to leave a $1/2^{\prime\prime}$ seam allowance.

Keep adding strips to the right, and strips with accent squares onto the left until you have 5 on the right and 5 on the left.

Steam-press the runner so it is very flat.

Using a rotary cutter and plastic ruler, trim the runner to 12" wide. This is easiest by measuring 6" away from the imaginary line running down the center of the accent blocks and cutting one side, then turn the runner around and do the same thing on the second side.

Stitch your border onto the long sides of the runner. *Note that the sides of your patchwork* runner are now cut on the bias and could stretch if you are not careful. Trim off excess. Stitch borders onto the short edges and trim off excess.

Repeat the sewing directions to make your second runner.

Quilt, bind, and enjoy!

Number of Blocks and Finished Size 2 Star Blocks 12" x 12" 1 Thrift Block 12" x 12"

2 squares 3½" x 3½" 16 squares 2" x 2"

Cream print

2 squares 5% x 5% \(\squares \)

8 rectangles 3½ x 6½ 8 squares 3½ x 3½

8 rectangles 2" x 31/5"

8 squares 2" x 2"

Pink/purple print and green/ pink floral—cut from each:

8 squares 31/2" x 31/2" Lavender print

1 square 61/2" x 61/2"

Cream/green large print 1 square 9% x 9% \square


2 squares 61/6" x 61/6" \(\squares \)

Green print

4 strips 21/2" x WOF (binding)



Draw diagonal line on wrong side of dark purple print 2" square. Referring to Diagram I, place marked square on cream print 2" x 3½" rectangle, right sides together, aligning raw edges. Stitch on drawn line; trim away and discard excess fabric. Open and press. Repeat on opposite end of rectangle to make small pieced rectangle. Make 8. In same manner, make large pieced rectangles in fabrics and quantities shown.





- 2 Sew 3 rows using 4 cream 2* squares, 4 small pieced rectangles, and dark purple 31/5" square (Diagram II). Stitch rows together to make small star. Make 2.
- 4 Sew cream 51/6" half-square triangles to sides of lavender 61/2" square (Diagram IV). Add cream/green large print 6% half-square triangles to make Thrift Block, Make 1.














Referring to Diagram III, sew 3 rows using 4 cream 31/2" squares, 4 matching large pieced rectangles, and small star. Stitch rows together to make Star Block, Make 2 total.




- 5 Referring to Assembly Diagram, sew Star Blocks and Thrift Block together as shown. Add cream/green 93%* half-square triangles to ends.
- 6 Layer, baste, and quilt. Bind with green print.


