<u>Catherine Wilson January 9, 2024 Lecture: Paper Piecing</u> <u>January 10, 2024 Workshop: Cactus or Twinkle Star</u>

Catherine is a quilt designer and certified Judy Niemeyer instructor. She started Queenie Quilts in 2010 to provide quilters with world class instruction and custom-built kits to assist them in making their own Judy Niemeyer masterpiece. She loves traditional piecing with a modern edge, reinterpreting old quilt blocks in new fabrics, or old fabrics in modern settings.



<u>Karen Brow-Meier February 13, 2024 Lecture: The Smuggle</u> Principles

February 14, 2024 Workshop: Newly Hatched

Karen has been a pattern and textile designer for over 20 years, specializing in animal themes with both pieced and appliquéd blocks. Her work has appeared in national magazines, books, calendars and catalogues. Her students learn what "makes a quilt sing" through concepts of color balance, using small and large scales of prints, and dramatic movement.



Sherri McConnell March 12, 2024 Lecture: A Quilting Life: Journey

March 13, 2024 Workshop: Scrappy Quilts

Sherri has been sewing since the age of 10 when she received her first sewing machine from her grandmother. She has since written three books and published patterns through her pattern company, Quilting Life Designs. She and her daughter design fabric for Moda. Sherri also loves to teach all about Scrap Quilting.



Kim Brownell April 9, 2024 Lecture: Wacky Doodle Trunk Show April 10, 2024 Workshop: Quilted Jigsaw Puzzle

Kim calls herself the "Wacky Doodle Quilter" due to her easy-going, whimsical style, and because she doesn't always follow the rules! She began quilting in 1993 and has been teaching since 2010. She gravitates towards animals, nature scenes, and bright colors. Her techniques include fabric collage, free form art quilts, raw edge appliqué, and many others.



Sandy Corbin May 14, 2024 Lecture: Making Scrappy Quilts Fresh May 15, 2024 Workshop: It's All About the Borders Pillow

Sandy started sewing in junior high and began making her own clothes in high school. She started making quilts in the '70's. In 2002 she founded "Sandy's Designs", started creating patterns, and has been teaching since 2004. She is local and is an active member of the Beach Cities Guild. For her workshop, she will be showing a variety of border designs that students can make into pillows.


Jane Haworth June 11, 2024 Lecture: Journey as a Quilt Artist June 12, 2024 Workshop: House and Home Fabric Collage

Jane has been quilting since 2003 but has been involved with fabric all her life. In 1998, she moved to Auburn, California, where she discovered quilt shops, a huge range of fabrics, and art quilts. She has entered many of her quilts in International Quilt shows and has an Etsy shop called Happy Quilt Designs. She loves Kaffe fabrics, and her favorite technique is raw edge collage appliqué. She uses photos of landscapes, sea-life, birds, and of the work of illustrator Charlie Harper.

Sheila Collins October 8, 2024 Lecture: My Creative Journey October 9, 2024 Workshop: Summer Escapades

Sheila has a background in fashion and graphic design using mainly fusible machine appliqué; she combines design skills with her love of sewing to create bright and cheery designs. Fun!







Block of the Month

Block of the Month 2023: Block #12

Here is our next log cabin variation -- called an Updated Wonky Log Cabin block. The 2023 focus fabric is from Hoffman and is called Paint Impressions. In addition to the focus fabric, you will need a white fabric and two additional coordinating fabrics based on the colors in the focus fabric. Remember, all our blocks end up 12.5" X 12.5" (a 12" finished block.) We will have the focus fabric available for sale at guild meetings for \$3 per fat quarter.



Also, the Guild's website and Facebook page should have a post directing you to the YouTube instructions for this block.

Cut list -- For one block:

White: scrap pieces for two sides of block

Focus Fabric (center): no bigger than 3" square, with four straight sides

Coordinating fabrics: scrap pieces for two sides of block

Notes: All strips should be at least 1" wide and no wider than 3".

Block needs at least three complete rounds of strips outside of the center.

Assembling the block: Use a quarter inch seam. Press to the newly added fabric in each step except the first.

- Step one: Lay the piece of focus fabric center right side up with the side you want to add a strip to on your right. Choose any of your other fabrics and place this fabric wrong side up on the focus fabric, align the tops and the right sides. Make sure this strip is long enough to cover the length of the focus fabric and sew these together. For this step, press the seam to the darker fabric. (Photo 2.)
- Lay the piece in front of you as in photo 2. Turn the unit 90° in either direction. Remember the direction you choose and after each piece is added, you will turn your block in that direction. Use a rotary cutter and ruler and trim so the right edge is straight, don't worry if it is at an angle. Continue as in step one and lay the next fabric even with the right edge and top. Sew on the piece and press to the newly added fabric.

Contruction Notes: I want to pause here, because this is where you need to take a look at you block and pay attention to the order you are adding fabrics. If your first two strips added were white, then the next two need to not be white fabric. This block is going to be assembled in the traditional log cabin layout: two adjacent sides are white and the other two are coordinating fabrics or the focus fabric. One other thing, it is easier if you wait to trim any strips you add until you get to that side. That is the method decribed above. If you trim before you get to the side, you may find you have trimmed too much.



Continue to add strips, turning the block 90°each time you add a strip until it is roughly 13.5"

square. If your 12.5" square up ruler can't cover the whole block, and there is extra showing on all sides it is large enough.

Using the 12.5" square up ruler, square the block to 12.5". Move the
ruler around until you find the final look you like best, while keeping in
mind that each side should have at least four strips added to the
center piece.



That Tricia Cribbs gal has put out at least 9 versions of her Turning Twenty pattern. All versions take 20 fat quarters, but most of the later versions also require some additional background fabric. We find her second version, *Turning Twenty Again*, to be the most ideal for veterans' quilts—it's got more going on in the pattern to make it look way more interesting than the original Turning Twenty, and it finishes up at our perfect size—64" x 80"! All you need are 20 fat quarters!

Thank you again to everyone who has jumped in to help Philanthropy in whatever way, to help make the lives of others a bit brighter. Your efforts are very much appreciated.




