PHILANTHROPY NEWS YOU CAN USE

If you are new to the guild, you may wonder who benefits from our Philanthropy program's efforts. They are as follows:

- 1) Babies: infant to crib sizes. These quilts go to veteran moms through the Women's Program of the Lima Linda VA. This program hosts a big annual baby shower in May (Mother's Day). Our goal is 70-100 baby quilts by May. (Any other new baby items you wish to donate are also welcome.)
- 2) Children: throw to twin sizes, boys and girls, toddlers to teens. These quilts are headed to the many foster children in our area. Estimates put the number of foster children in the Valley at 1,400. That's a lot of children caught in the system whose lives could be brightened with a quilt.
- 3) Formerly homeless male veterans at March ARB in the US Vets program. For these folks, quilts NEED to be twin size to fit their beds—minimum 64" x 80". These quilts can be somewhat wider and/or longer, but please be sure your quilt hits those minimums. Our quilts are very popular with the vets. Other than the size minimums, we ask that you please DO NOT INCLUDE PINKS, EXCESSIVE FLORALS OR OTHER OBVIOUSLY FEMININE PRINTS, AND NO JUVENILE PRINTS.
- 4) Female veterans through the Lima Linda VA women's program. Lap to twin sizes.
- 5) Women and children at our local domestic violence shelter.
- 6) Pillowcases for men, women, small boys and girls, and older boys and girls.

PILLOWCASES: if you sew pillowcases for us, either from one of our kits or on your own, we ask that you please DO NOT SERGE them, but rather, use the French seam method, and please tack down the accent strip edge. The result of this method is a beautiful pillowcase that is constructed better than you can buy in any store.

ALSO—somehow, some way, some of our philanthropy pillowcases ended up being offered for sale in the boutique part of the quilt show. This is not good. Please return philanthropy pillowcase kits to philanthropy.

Huge thanks to all who continue to sew for us, whether you contribute finished quilts, or quilt tops, or pillowcases, or those who bind quilts for us. It is totally okay to bind by machine, but we ask that you check your work before turning it in. We've recently had to re-bind half a quilt because the binding onnthe back side did not get caught in the process. Thanks! Big thanks to Liz Lehner who keeps giving us tops, and to non member Karen Guglielmetti who just donated two tops as well. Daina Katz and Candy Flory-Barnes have contributed SO MANY finished quilts and pillowcases—we are grateful! You have big hearts.

Philanthropy, cont.

ARE YOU A LONG-ARM QUILTER? We need your help! Currently the huge bulk of our quilting is being handled by Maryruth Wilson and Edna Wright. They are overloaded and could really use a break. If you can take a few philanthropy quilts, we would be grateful. All we ask is edge to edge quilting, (no special patterns), neutral thread (no need to match color—in fact, we'd prefer just a neutral) and please bury your knots/tie them off.

PLEASE CHECK TENSION on your machine. Bad tension can pretty much ruin an otherwise fine quilting job.

Block of the Month

Block of The Month 2021: Block #11

Our block this month is an improv spinning star block This is another four-patch block, so each sub-block is 6.5". We think this block looks great with thin star pieces, but you can adjust that if you prefer a bigger star.

To get started, here are the fabrics you need: your focus fabric, a coordinating fabric based on the colors in the focus fabric, and two neutral color fabrics. Pick ones that contrast with each other. (Neutral colors include black, brown, grey, white, and shades or hues of these.) Remember, all our blocks end up 12.5" X 12.5" (a 12" finished block.)

Also, the Guild's website and Facebook page should have a post directing you to the YouTube instructions for this block.

Cut list -- For one block - you decide fabric placement Fabric 1 (background squares): Four 6.75" squares Fabric 2, 3 & 4 (star points): Total of four rectangles. Approximate size 2.75" X 5.5" -at least one of each fabric. To keep the point narrow, don't use a piece wider than 3.5".

Assembling the block: Use a guarter inch seam

- To make the star points: Place fabrics 2, 3 & 4 right side up on cutting mat. Have all the pieces oriented the same. Make one diagonal cut from the bottom to the top (either with a ruler or free cut it) and make sure you make the cut the same on all pieces. To get the look in our sample, I cut from the bottom right to the top left. If you do the opposite, the star will spin the opposite direction.
- Decide the color placement of your eight points, two on each of the four patch units. Since each point is unique you will mark the placement of each triangle and then sew it on. Refer to photo 2 and place a triangle piece on the corner of a background square, at this point have both pieces right side up, in one corner (if you cut opposite, yours will look reversed.) Move the triangle so it extends beyond the edge of the background 1/2" on the outer two sides. Make a mark on the background fabric edges on both sides. You can see my marks in photo 3 (I have pulled back the triangle so you can see them. Now flip the triangle over onto the square so right sides are facing together. Align the hypotenuse of the triangle to these marks, but only have the top point stick up 1/4" as shown in photo 4.

Sew triangle to background square with a 1/4" seam as shown in photo 5. Make sure you sew off the end right between where the background meets the triangle (see arrow in photo 5.) Repeat with all triangles, placing them in opposite corners.

- Trim off the extra background fabric as shown in photo 6. Press the triangle points out. Now trim off any extra fabric by putting a ruler in the corner points just sewn on. As you can see in photo 7, I am using a 6.5" square up ruler and the block is slightly oversized. Don't worry about that now, just make sure the units are at least 6.5" square and trim off the uneven parts of the corners. You should have four units with triangles on two opposite corners at this point.
- Now arrange these units as shown in photo 1. Try different arrangements to get your favorite. After you decide your arrangement, sew together horizonal rows. Press the seams in opposite directions. Nest the center seams and sew the final seam. Press.
- Now to square it up. Use your 121/2" X 121/2" square up ruler, place it over the block. Make sure there is fabric under all parts of the ruler and trim to 12½" X 12½". You can make it wonky or not, it is your decision what you like best.







Opportunity Quilt 2022

We will be able to sell tickets for our new opportunity guilt at the Road to California guilt show at the Ontario Convention Center on January 20, 2022. In order to be allowed to sell tickets we must provide 20 hours of white glove service at the show. The show runs from Wednesday, January 19th through Saturday, January 22nd, 2022. They also have a preview night on Tuesday, January 18th. A white glove volunteer signs up for a two hour shift for any of the days of the show or the preview night on Tuesday. The volunteer will be given an apron and the white gloves and will be assigned an area to work the two hour shift. The volunteer will be able to touch the guilts and show the backs or point out interesting aspects of the quilts to the visitors at the show. I had a sign up sheet at the October meeting and many members signed up to do the white glove shifts. I still need a few more to sign up to get the 20 hours we need. The November meeting is the last chance to sign up as they require the list be returned to the Road to California committee before December. Please check your calendar and consider signing up for the white glove duty so that our opportunity quilt, Shakespeare in the Park, will be able to go to the show. I will also need two or three volunteers to help sell tickets for the guilt on Thursday, January 20th. You get to sit at a table to sell tickets. Everyone who volunteers to be a white glover or to sell tickets will get a wrist band for free admission to all days of the Road show. Please see me at the meeting to sign up as a volunteer.
